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28 V. Approval of Minutes: February 4, 2010

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30 **Motion was made by Commissioner Gray to approve the minutes of the February 4,**
31 **2010, meeting, seconded by Commissioner Lucarelli and motion carried unanimously.**

32
33 VI. Special Presentations

34
35 A. 2010 Census – John Horvath, Vice Chairman, Complete Count Committee

36
37 John Horvath, Vice Chairman of the Complete Count Committee, came forward. He said the
38 County appointed the committee back in the summer and we basically have a business, a
39 faith, and an education and government committee. We are all working together. The City did
40 a resolution several months ago and he expressed thanks for the support. He said the City's
41 representative is Steve Noto so anyone can contact him with any questions.

42
43 Mr. Horvath said we are moving along and was sure everyone had seen ads on TV about the
44 census. This is important. The City's approximate population is 15,000 and didn't know how
45 much it had grown since the last census, but the census helps with funds. We are worth at
46 least \$1,000 to our government for schools, roads, community block grants, etc. One of the

1 important things is representation in Washington, especially at the U.S. Congress. He said he
2 had seen estimates and could gain as many as three for the State of Florida. Also for the state
3 they will re-district the House Legislature so it's important that everyone is counted. He said it
4 was his understanding there was information in the utility bills and newsletters and there was a
5 link on the website. Lake Mary has cooperated with the County, the other cities and the
6 School Board on this endeavor.

7
8 Mr. Horvath said this year it is more important than ever because of the economics. If we don't
9 get people counted, it is going to cost us money in the long run. We don't need that and
10 hopefully everyone will fill out their forms. It is a simple 10-question form. It is confidential so
11 nobody is going to come after you for alimony or if you are here illegally. That is not allowed
12 by law. It is very good for the County. Lake Mary is up to 15,000 and hopefully they can help
13 with things you have planned.

14
15 Deputy Mayor Brender asked when these forms would be going out and for how long a period
16 of time.

17
18 Mr. Horvath said they would be mailed in mid-March. They are coming to your physical
19 address—not P.O. boxes. They need to be returned by April 1st. If you return your form,
20 nobody will come knocking at your door because they've got the form. It's when you don't fill
21 the form out or if you are in a hard to find location then they will physically have a census taker
22 from the government come out and talk to you. If you fill out the 10 questions and mail it back
23 then you are done.

24
25 Commissioner Gray asked Mr. Horvath to convey to everyone that he contacts that we are
26 wasting money. She said she had been to two other presentations on the census and have
27 gotten a bag full of junk. She said she didn't know what that costs. It is a backpack type of bag
28 and has a huge map in it, which is very interesting, but we all don't need those. It had a pencil,
29 letter opener and notepad. She said she had sent e-mails to those on high. We keep talking
30 about money but then the Census Bureau goes out and spends God knows how much money
31 on that. She asked Mr. Horvath to convey to not order any more. That is such a waste.

32
33 Mr. Horvath said he felt the same way and would mention that. He questioned why we need
34 drinking cups and other things if we have the advertisements. We need to spend the money to
35 make sure the programs are right so the translations for all the different nationalities won't
36 scare them away from filling them out.

38 B. Presentation – Lake Jesup Basin Management Action Plan (BMAP) – Bruce Paster
39 1. Authorize City Manager to execute Statement of Commitment to Support
40 Lake Jesup Basin Management Action Plan Implementation
41

42 Mr. Paster said Chris Ferraro from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection
43 presented an overview of Florida's Total Maximum Daily Load Program to the Commission in
44 March 2009. He said tonight he would present where they are with the Lake Jesup Basin
45 Management Action Plan which is a result of the Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) Program
46 of that work that was performed in the basin.

1
2 Mr. Paster said the Lake Jesup drainage basin includes areas in all seven cities of Seminole
3 County, four cities in Orange County, as well as unincorporated areas of both counties. There
4 are three transportation entities: FDOT, Orlando-Orange County Expressway Authority, and
5 the Turnpike Authority as well as many agricultural properties that all drain into Lake Jesup.
6 He showed a map of the Lake Jesup Basin.
7

8 Mr. Paster said Lake Mary has been involved in both the Total Maximum Daily Load Program
9 and Basin Management Action Plan for about four years. The first step is to determine the
10 maximum amount of pollutants that Lake Jesup can assimilate without causing water quality
11 issues in the lake. That process is known as the TMDL Program.
12

13 Mr. Paster said the total maximum daily load of phosphorous and nitrogen was established to
14 determine the maximum amount of these pollutants that the lake could safely handle. This
15 was compared to measured amounts of these nutrients entering Lake Jesup. The difference
16 between the TMDL and the actual load was calculated and became the target for removal in
17 the Basin Management Action Plan.
18

19 Mr. Paster said determining a total maximum daily load is not an exact science. Many
20 assumptions had to be made and there was much discussion of the accuracy and
21 appropriateness for the total maximum daily loads, the model which created them, and also
22 how that would affect the Basin Management Action Plan. Technical uncertainties will be
23 discussed later in the presentation. Essentially they said the lake could handle 41,000 pounds
24 of total phosphorous and 500,000 pounds of total nitrogen. That is what the lake can
25 assimilate without causing health problems.
26

27 Mr. Paster said the Basin Management Action Plan is focusing only on reducing external loads
28 to Lake Jesup and is only looking at phosphorous. There are a lot of uncertainties related to
29 nitrogen so it's easier to just look at phosphorous. There are a lot of uncertainties of what
30 happens inside the lake so they are only going to look at what's entering the lake. The goal is
31 to make the required nutrient reductions in a 15-year period. The Basin Management Action
32 Plan is only addressing the first five years and one-third of the target reductions. They took the
33 total reductions and mainly because of all the uncertainties just cut it in thirds and we will write
34 a basin management action plan in five years and try to get rid of one-third of the amount of
35 nutrients.
36

37 Mr. Paster said based on the TMDL, FDEP has determined the basin's stakeholders must
38 reduce the total loading of phosphorous to Lake Jesup by almost 19,000 pounds per year.
39 The plan is to accomplish that over 15 years. Lake Mary's allocation of this reduction is
40 approximately 800 pounds per year. Lake Mary's allocation in the Basin Management Action
41 Plan is one-third of that over the first five years, two-thirds the next five years, and all 793
42 pounds by the end of the 15-year period.
43

44 Mr. Paster said phosphorous reduction credit was given per management actions already in
45 place within the City. These include stormwater ponds, swales, ditches, street sweeping, and
46 stormwater education efforts including the Florida Yards and Neighborhoods Program. More

1 recently most of the City was developed with stormwater ponds. That is a best management
2 practice and reduces nutrients. Older parts of the City were developed without stormwater
3 facilities.

4
5 Mr. Paster showed a list of projects and phosphorous reduction credits received for each
6 project. We have already met our first five-year commitment of 264 pounds per year
7 phosphorous reduction. The majority of credit is given to existing management practices, i.e.
8 stormwater ponds that were in place at the time the TMDL model calculation was made.
9 Those best management practices include not only stormwater ponds but all the management
10 practices that we have in place. We do street sweeping twice a year and we get credit for that.
11 We get credit for all the education efforts we do. In Lake Mary Woods we eliminated septic
12 tanks and got credit for that project. In the second five-year period we will have to double the
13 amount of reductions. For the first five-year period we don't have to enter into any cooperative
14 projects to reduce because we have met it. In the second five years we are going to have to
15 reduce twice as much.

16
17 Mr. Paster said the reason the Basin Management Action Plan is focusing only on one-third of
18 the required reductions is that many technical uncertainties are encountered in determining
19 total maximum daily load and allocating the required reductions to entities in the basin. Lake
20 Mary is most interested in attenuation in non-contributing areas. It is our belief that all of Lake
21 Mary's nutrient load into Soldiers Creek is attenuated by the large wetlands along the creek.
22 It is our intention to show FDEP that Lake Mary does not contribute to the phosphorous load of
23 Lake Jesup due to the natural ability of our wetlands to remove phosphorous from the water.
24 This will be demonstrated with empirical data obtained from the proposed monitoring program
25 and the Basin Management Action Plan. We also believe Big Lake Mary should be considered
26 a non-contributing area.

27
28 Mr. Paster said data from Lake Mary and throughout the entire basin will be gathered to
29 address these issues through sampling, analysis and additional research studies. A new
30 maximum load model and new allocation process will be completed at the end of the five
31 years. For five years everyone is working on all these uncertainties.

32
33 Mr. Paster said the objective of the basin monitoring plan is to track trends and nutrient loads
34 from each jurisdiction, to refine the model and better understand many of these uncertainties.
35 There are 23 stations throughout the basin and Lake Mary will perform sampling at three of
36 these locations at a cost of \$7,000 to \$10,000 per year. One is upstream and one is
37 downstream of Soldiers Creek and one is at the outfall of Big Lake Mary. We hope to show
38 that the City is not contributing to the phosphorous load into Lake Jesup but reduces the
39 loading through attenuation. We anticipate showing the amount of phosphorous leaving the
40 City is less than what is entering. We have done some quarterly sampling in the past for a
41 couple of years and we saw what was leaving Soldiers Creek had less phosphorous than what
42 was entering. It is all wetlands through there and wetlands naturally uptake phosphorous. We
43 were not given any credit for that in the allocation process. They just looked at land use maps
44 and allocated.

1 Mr. Paster said Big Lake Mary was based on 300 water surface elevation readings since 1978.
2 The lake flows to its outfall less than 2% of the time. That's why there is a range of what it's
3 going to cost. If there is no water flowing out of Big Lake Mary there is no sample/analysis to
4 take. We will probably be closer to \$7,000 than \$10,000 because we will only be sampling two
5 locations instead of three.

6
7 Mr. Paster said TP staff expects secretarial adoption of the Basin Management Action Plan by
8 the end of May and they have asked all the entities involved to get letters of commitment from
9 the governments. A copy of a Statement of Commitment to Support Plan Implementations is
10 included in the Commission's packets. Staff recommends the Commission authorize the City
11 Manager to endorse the Statement of Commitment.

12
13 Commissioner Gray said it was stated that Big Lake Mary is a non-contributing area.

14
15 Mr. Paster said there is an outfall to Big Lake Mary but Big Lake Mary doesn't rise to an
16 elevation high enough to flow out of the outfall. They have been taking elevations in Big Lake
17 Mary—300 since 1978—and maybe four times did it flow to its outfall during the hurricanes. He
18 said he anticipated in the next five years when we sample monthly to maybe get one or two
19 data points. They are going to argue to FDEP that you can't contribute a loading from the Big
20 Lake Mary Basin because it never flows. They didn't have all this data in their model. The
21 model is very general and they looked at land uses throughout the basin. They said based on
22 these land uses you're responsible for X amount of pounds per year. Now we are going to get
23 some empirical data and refine that model.

24
25 Commissioner Gray asked about the testing that Tom West does.

26
27 Mr. Paster said he wasn't familiar with the testing Mr. West does. There is very specific testing
28 and there is a list of parameters for 23 stations throughout the basin. They are going to take all
29 the input from these 23 stations and re-run that model for both allocating the amount to remove
30 and also for the model of what Lake Jesup can handle.

31
32 Commissioner Gray said we are ahead of our requirements.

33
34 Mr. Paster said we are only looking at the first five years, or one-third. Because of all these
35 uncertainties, they didn't want to burden everybody with the full amount. All the cities are
36 saying there are too many uncertainties and can't agree to that. He said he couldn't come to
37 the Commission in good faith and say the City needs to spend \$5 million to remove all this
38 phosphorous based on all these uncertainties. All the engineers are saying that same thing
39 and said we will back off and the cities are required to remove one-third of the total for now
40 and we will take another look in five years. It is very complicated and difficult. We have been
41 working on this for about five years already to get to this point.

42
43 Deputy Mayor Brender said he gathered the expectation was the phosphorous is coming from
44 fertilizers and lawns. Mr. Paster said that was correct.

45
46 Deputy Mayor Brender asked if Big Lake Mary had a TMDL for phosphorous.

1
2 Mr. Paster answered negatively. The TMDL Program is only for a few large basins. Lake
3 Mary is part of the Lake Jesup Basin.

4
5 Deputy Mayor Brender said we don't know how much phosphorous is in Big Lake Mary unless
6 it overflows.

7
8 Mr. Paster said that was correct and we will measure it when it overflows. It leaves the City
9 mainly through Soldiers Creek. We will measure Soldiers Creek monthly and find out the
10 phosphorous concentration leaving Soldiers Creek. They are doing another TMDL in Lake
11 Monroe. The northern part of our city drains to Lake Monroe. We will go through this entire
12 process again on the northern half of the City once they determine the TMDL for Lake Monroe.
13 The southern half of the City drains to Lake Jesup.

14
15 Deputy Mayor Brender asked what we do to stop it. He asked if we restrict fertilization and if
16 that was the only answer.

17
18 Mr. Paster said there are many ways to attack it. They are looking to put in large treatment
19 basins. They are doing that in Lake County. Just outside of Lake Jesup where most of the
20 flow is coming in, you would sidetrack the flow to the very large basin and treat the water and
21 remove the nutrients. If we put money into it we get credit. Since we are all in the basin
22 together they are looking for all the entities to do a joint project. We give them a few million
23 dollars and put a huge treatment project in and remove some of the phosphorous. In five
24 years that's probably what's going to be happening.

25
26 **Motion was made by Commissioner Lucarelli to authorize the City Manager to execute**
27 **Statement of Commitment to Support Lake Jesup Management Action Plan**
28 **Implementation, seconded by Commissioner Gray and motion carried unanimously.**

29
30 VII. Unfinished Business

- 31
32 A. Ordinance No. 1345 – Rezone from County R-1BB to City R-1B for Huntington
33 Pointe 4A, 4B and 4C – Second Reading (Public Hearing) (quasi-judicial)

34
35 The City Attorney read Ordinance No. 1345 by title only on second reading.

36
37 Mr. Schindler stated staff had nothing further to add.

38
39 Deputy Mayor Brender asked if anyone wanted to speak on this matter. No one came forward
40 and the public hearing was closed.

41
42 **Motion was made by Commissioner Lucarelli to approve Ordinance No. 1345 on second**
43 **reading, seconded by Commissioner Gray and motion carried by roll-call vote:**
44 **Commissioner Duryea, Yes; Commissioner Gray, Yes; Commissioner Lucarelli, Yes;**
45 **Deputy Mayor Brender, Yes.**

1 VIII. New Business

2
3 A. Resolution No. 861 – Approve Supplemental LAP Agreement reducing funding for
4 resurfacing International Parkway from AAA Drive to Lake Mary Boulevard

5
6 The City Attorney read Resolution No. 861 by title only.

7
8 Mr. Litton said the City had three projects. Two were on International Parkway and the other
9 on Rinehart Road. We have completed Rinehart Road except for final striping and cleanup.
10 We will be starting the International Parkway projects in early March.

11
12 Mr. Litton said the state has asked all participants to de-obligate any extra monies that were
13 allocated. In our case it is \$35,944 and is the difference between the original LAP agreement,
14 which was an estimate, and the bid that came in plus the CEI services. The state wants us to
15 de-obligate that and spread the wealth to other projects under the American Recovery and
16 Reinvestment Act. Staff recommends approval and also the associated budget adjustment
17 which will transfer that money back out.

18
19 Commissioner Duryea asked if we could keep some for contingencies. Mr. Litton answered
20 negatively.

21
22 Deputy Mayor Brender asked what happens if we end up \$10,000 over budget. Mr. Litton said
23 we could go back and ask for it but we may end up having to pay for it. This is basically truing
24 up the numbers from the estimate to the bid. We don't have a choice.

25
26 **Motion was made by Commissioner Duryea to approve Resolution No. 861 and the**
27 **associated budget adjustment, seconded by Commissioner Lucarelli and motion carried**
28 **by roll-call vote: Commissioner Gray, Yes; Commissioner Lucarelli, Yes; Commissioner**
29 **Duryea, Yes; Deputy Mayor Brender, Yes.**

30
31 IX. Citizen Participation

32
33 No one came forward at this time and citizen participation was closed.

34
35 X. Reports

36
37 A. City Manager

38
39 Mr. Litton said he had distributed Resolution No. 862 in tribute to Harriett Boyd who passed
40 away on Monday. He read the resolution designating February 20, 2010, as a day of mourning
41 from the City of Lake Mary in honor of Harriett French Hayman Boyd.

42
43 Deputy Mayor Brender said Hattie has been more than just a long-time resident. She has
44 been a friend to the City and the Commission and a real matriarch. She will be missed.

1 Commissioner Gray said Harriett was on the Historical Commission and was a ringleader
2 there. She encouraged everyone to read the obituary in today's Orlando Sentinel.

3
4 Mr. Litton said this resolution will be presented at Harriett's services on Saturday at 11:00 A.M.
5 at the No Limits Church (formerly The Crossings Community Church) at 390 Longwood-Lake
6 Mary Road and her interment will be at Evergreen Cemetery on 25th Street. There will be a
7 reception at the Historical Museum at 2:00 P.M.

8
9 **Motion was made by Commissioner Gray to approve Resolution No. 862, seconded by**
10 **Commissioner Lucarelli and motion carried by roll-call vote: Commissioner Lucarelli,**
11 **Yes; Commissioner Duryea, Yes; Commissioner Gray, Yes; Deputy Mayor Brender, Yes.**

12
13 1. Request Commission make appointments/reappointments to Code Enforcement Board

14
15 Mr. Litton suggested waiting until they had a full Commission to make this appointment.

16
17 **Motion was made by Commissioner Duryea to postpone the appointment to the Code**
18 **Enforcement Board until March 18, 2010, seconded by Commissioner Gray and motion**
19 **carried unanimously.**

20
21 2. Request Commission authorize expenditure from Law Enforcement Trust Fund for
22 donation to Crimeline in an amount not to exceed \$1,000 and authorize City manager to
23 execute associated budget adjustment

24
25 Mr. Litton said this is a request to expend from the Police Forfeiture Fund a donation to
26 Crimeline in the amount of \$1,000. He thought it was a very worthwhile program. They are
27 running low on funds and all of the departments are being asked to contribute. He asked that
28 the Commission also approve the associated budget adjustment.

29
30 **Motion was made by Commissioner Duryea to authorize expenditure from the Law**
31 **Enforcement Trust for a donation to Crimeline in the amount of \$1,000 and authorize**
32 **City Manager to execute associated budget adjustment, seconded by Commissioner**
33 **Gray and motion carried unanimously.**

34
35 3. Request Commission cancel March 4, 2010, City Commission meeting

36
37 Mr. Litton said this is a request to cancel the March 4, 2010, Commission meeting. We have
38 nothing coming forward.

39
40 **Motion was made by Commissioner Lucarelli to cancel the March 4, 2010, City**
41 **Commission meeting, seconded by Commissioner Gray and motion carried**
42 **unanimously.**

43
44 Mr. Litton said the Commission has a memorandum that was distributed by Mr. Omana
45 regarding the future land use designations on properties located south and east of the CSX

1 Railroad and north of Lake Mary Boulevard. He asked Mr. Omana to address this and ask for
2 Commission direction.

3
4 Mr. Omana said this addresses the land use designations on the east side of the railroad
5 tracks. He showed the area on the exhibit. The commuter rail station is scheduled to open in
6 2012 and we believe that is going to be a catalyst for redevelopment. In discussions with Mr.
7 Litton, Mr. Schindler and staff we have concluded that it's important that we set the regulatory
8 table as quickly as possible so as to be ready for any potential legislative or constitutional
9 initiatives that may affect the land use arena. Given the existing land use designations are
10 basically LMDR (Low Medium Density Residential), in order to develop under the ACi plans we
11 would need to have the DDD land use designation on the Downtown Development District.

12
13 Mr. Omana said we are presenting two options. The first option is to notify all the owners
14 within this area designated on the map of the City's desire to initiate small scale land use
15 amendments to the DDD land use designation. This generally would take about two to three
16 months. The City would waive the \$500 application fee provided the applications are filed with
17 the City by April 30, 2010. We would advise them of a community meeting to be scheduled on
18 March 11, 2010, at 6:00 P.M. in the Commission Chambers to further explain the proposal,
19 answer any questions, and outline any technical issues.

20
21 Mr. Omana said the second option would involve doing an administrative land use amendment
22 for approximately 43 acres depicted on the map. Under this approach we are looking at a 12
23 to 18-month timeline which requires DCA review, ORC review, and multi-agency review. We
24 feel under that scenario if somebody were to appeal they could do so and delay the entire
25 process.

26
27 Mr. Omana said regardless of whether the Commission asks staff to do Option 1 or 2, we are
28 going ahead and modifying Chapter 154.67 to amend the master plan downtown boundaries to
29 reflect the boundaries of the ACi plan. He said he, Mr. Schindler and Mr. Noto will start on that
30 immediately.

31
32 Mr. Omana said in light of what we are proposing to do with the land use designation begs the
33 question: Does this modify or increase the taxes in any way? He said he had an opportunity
34 to chat with the folks in the property appraiser's office and their answer was they would deal
35 with this on a case-by-case basis. We would encourage individual property owners to contact
36 the property appraiser's office directly to get specifics on their case. When the land use
37 amendments were done in 2000 changing the existing master plan area to DDD, we found no
38 documentation in the file that showed that the DDD land use was being contested on ad
39 valorem grounds.

40
41 Mr. Omana said in further discussions with the appraiser's office, generally the tax increase
42 occurs once you have the proposed construction under the new zoning finalized, the CO, and
43 the whole project completed. At that time a potential increase would occur. What's important
44 to note is the proposals laid out this evening involve modifying the land use and not the zoning.
45 If the folks subsequently wish to change their zoning they can do so. That is the exact
46 approach we took in 2001 to avoid any tax liability.

1
2 Mr. Omana said we feel this approach with the land use will create a win-win situation not only
3 for the City as a potential redevelopment base but also for the property owners in a civil
4 transaction and there will be some benefit there.

5
6 Mr. Omana said staff recommends Option 1 be carried forward and authorize staff to
7 implement that and to also schedule the public education meeting for March 11, 2010, at 6:00
8 P.M. in the City Commission Chambers.

9
10 **It was the consensus to authorize staff to proceed with Option 1 as outlined in the staff**
11 **report.**

12
13 Commissioner Gray asked what would be the downside to any resident. Mr. Omana said he
14 didn't see a downside from a planning perspective.

15
16 Mr. Litton said the only thing is the taxes and that is the one that people become concerned
17 with. We have to address that early on.

18
19 Deputy Mayor Brender said we have history with the current downtown district and it was his
20 understanding those taxes didn't change for the residential users.

21
22 Mr. Litton said it was just those properties where something was built. He encouraged the
23 Commission to attend that meeting on March 11th.

24
25 Mr. Litton said the Commission was notified that the meeting with elected officials and city
26 managers from the various cities in Seminole County scheduled for February 27th has been
27 canceled. That was done at the Mayors/Managers meeting. We are just not ready to go
28 forward with it yet. We've got to build some consensus.

29
30 Mr. Litton announced that Lake Mary Celebrates will be held on March 6, 2010, at Central Park
31 from 10:00 A.M. to 3:00 P.M. It's a great arts and crafts festival with good food and
32 entertainment and it's free. The Farmer's Market will also be open that day during their regular
33 hours.

34
35 Mr. Litton reminded everyone that daylight savings time begins on March 14th and at that point
36 in time you can go back to watering twice a week. Even numbered residences may water on
37 Wednesdays and Saturdays and odd numbers on Thursdays and Sundays. No watering
38 between 10:00 A.M. and 4:00 P.M.

39
40 Mr. Litton said Little League Opening Day would be Saturday, February 20th, from 10:00 A.M.
41 to 11:15 A.M. The Commission needs to be there by 9:45 so they can take pictures. There
42 will be reserved parking at the normal place by the concession stand.

43
44 Mr. Litton said we are going to do a wedding at Central Park in April. We have had requests
45 for that on several occasions and wanted to try it and see how it's going to work.

1 B. Mayor

3 Deputy Mayor Brender said the City of Lake Mary is hosting CALNO on March 3rd and
4 everyone is invited.

8 Deputy Mayor Brender said the Weston is becoming quite an addition for the City with many
9 events being hosted there. It is a beautiful facility.

11 Deputy Mayor Brender said he attended the State of the County lunch. He said Commissioner
12 Dallari did a great job of putting a positive spin to what is otherwise a not so great situation with
13 county and city budgets these days. We will survive.

17 Commissioner Duryea had no report at this time.

18
19 Commissioner Gray said she attended the Tri-County League of Cities at Disney. The Mayor
20 of Main Street, U.S.A. was there to greet us and made the opening remarks.

21
22 Commissioner Gray said one of the legislative things we might want to watch is the payment
23 fees for the foreclosure proceedings which require financial institutions to make timely
24 payments to associations for foreclosed property.

25
26 Commissioner Gray said another thing we might want to watch is the revised term limits. They
27 are looking at two 6-year terms for the Senate and three 4-year terms for the House for a total
28 of 12 years for either one. The guesstimate is it probably won't get on the agenda this year.

29
30 Commissioner Gray said the other one is the Taxpayers' Bill of Rights. There is no bill yet for
31 that. They feel it will be in 2011.

32
33 Commissioner Gray said it looked like the red light cameras would be on the agenda in 2010.
34 She said we have heard a lot about that and she had all kinds of information.

35
36 Deputy Mayor Brender said the County is putting that off until we get legislative action. Mr.
37 Litton said that is delayed for just one more meeting and they are going to bring it back up.

38
39 Commissioner Lucarelli said she went to Lake Mary Elementary School for the Sunshine State
40 Reader talk. There were some polite, well-mannered fourth graders with some good questions
41 and deep thoughts for fourth graders.

42
43 Commissioner Lucarelli said we have a Lake Mary Relay for Life team going. It is April 16th
44 and 17th and invited everyone to join. It is to raise money for the American Cancer Society.

1 Commissioner Lucarelli reminded everyone of the Prayer Breakfast tomorrow at 7:00 A.M. at
2 the Marriott.

3
4 Commissioner Lucarelli said Family Fun Day is coming along and is getting bigger by the day.
5 We've got full merchant association support and it's going to be huge. She said Marie
6 Crawford did a flier but it is not finished because they are still adding stuff. She asked if they
7 could put the flier on the website. Mr. Litton answered affirmatively. Commissioner Lucarelli
8 said the merchants are donating the printing, we will have posters, and black and white copies
9 of schools through DARE. It will be held April 24th from 11:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. at City Hall.
10 There will be games and activities for all ages.
