30 V. Approval of Minutes: February 18, 2010

31
32 **Motion was made by Commissioner Gray to approve the minutes of the February**
33 **18, 2010, meeting as submitted, seconded by Commissioner Lucarelli and motion**
34 **carried unanimously.**

35
36 Mayor Mealor recognized representatives from the University of Central Florida School
37 of Public Administration as part of their class assignments. Any student is welcome at
38 any time. Any member of the Commission or staff stand ready to assist if there is
39 follow-up information needed.

41 VI. Special Presentations

42
43 1. Special Recognition – Joe Rosier

44
45 Mayor Mealor said this is a very special recognition for a very special and distinguished
46 gentleman in the community. He asked Mr. Joseph Rosier to come to the podium.

1 Mayor Meador read and presented a plaque to Mr. Rosier in appreciation for his service
2 on the Code Enforcement Board.

3
4 Mr. Rosier said he had been on the Code Enforcement Board since 1986 and there
5 have been a number of illustrious citizens that have been on it. Doc Jore was on the
6 code board and later became a commissioner. Clay Simmons was on the code board
7 and became a judge. Donna McIntosh was the attorney for many years and she
8 became a judge. Last but not least there was Randy Morris. He said he met Randy
9 when Randy first came to town and in about three weeks he applied to be on the Code
10 Enforcement Board. He was on the board for about a year and then ran for City
11 Commission and then the County Commission and he became infamous. He said he
12 had been on the board since 1986 and Joel Ivey since 1985 as the chairman. He said
13 Joel was not going to resign any time soon and figured this would be a good time to get
14 a nice plaque from the City. He thanked everyone for the honor. It has been a pleasure
15 serving the City of Lake Mary.

16
17 2. Proclamation – “Children’s Week” and “Parents and Children’s Day”

18
19 Mayor Meador asked Jeff Griesemer to come to the podium.

20
21 The City Attorney read and Mayor Meador presented a proclamation to Jeff Griesemer
22 proclaiming April 11 – 17, 2010, as “Children’s Week” and April 17, 2010, as “Parents
23 and Children’s Day”.

24
25 Jeff Griesemer, CEO/President of Child Rescue Network, thanked the Commission for
26 their show of support. This proclamation will help raise awareness of the serious issues
27 facing our children and families and hopefully raise awareness of some of the resources
28 available to help. Last year the Seminole County Sheriff’s Department responded to
29 over 4,000 reports of child abuse in Seminole County. The need is great and we
30 appreciate this proclamation and you lending your voices to help raise awareness for
31 this issue.

32
33 Mayor Meador asked Chief Bracknell to come forward. He presented to Chief Bracknell
34 a Certificate of Appreciation from the Orlando Sanford International Airport for
35 “Operation Haiti Relief” from January 16, 2010 to February 8, 2010. He said the
36 Certificate of Appreciation is presented to Chief Bracknell and the Lake Mary Police
37 Department for the invaluable humanitarian services and support that he and his team
38 rendered throughout that entire process. We saw a lot of these flights come forward.
39 The recognition that this community gets in many ways is reflective by the service that
40 Chief Bracknell and his team rendered at a time of need for others. On behalf of the
41 Commission he extended congratulations for a job well done.

42
43 Chief Bracknell thanked the Commission, city management, and citizens for giving them
44 the resources so they could offer a helping hand and help feed and give them clothing.
45 He thanked Commissioner Gray for everything she has done.

1 Mr. Litton read a statement from Community Relations Officer Zach Hudson. It is
2 important and speaks to what Chief Bracknell was alluding to:

3
4 "I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation for the
5 outstanding job Commissioner Gray did for the Lake Mary Police
6 Department Haitian relief disaster efforts. She spent two weeks of
7 countless hours organizing emergency supplies for the devastated country
8 of Haiti. Commissioner Gray recruited dozens of volunteers who were
9 able to sort and categorize large quantities of supplies. It was through her
10 leadership and dedication that made the Haitian relief effort a success. In
11 summary, Commissioner Gray and her wonderful volunteers rocked and
12 made a real difference."

13
14 Mr. Litton extended thanks to Commissioner Gray.

15
16 The Commission changed the order of the agenda and heard Item 4 at this time.

17
18 4. Recognition from FEMA for Lake Mary's participation in the National Flood
19 Insurance Program

20
21 Mayor Mealor asked Bruce Paster and Brian Bates to come forward. Mayor Mealor
22 read and presented the award to Mr. Paster. He asked Mr. Paster to tell the citizens
23 what this award means to them.

24
25 Mr. Paster said over a year ago, our previous Stormwater Engineer Durga Nagda
26 presented the idea that we could apply for community rating. Community rating is
27 something FEMA does and has to do with how you build in your city—your ordinances,
28 rules, building department, and inspections as it relates to floodplain managements.
29 We applied and during that year brought forward a stormwater ordinance, a revision to
30 our existing ordinances, revisions to our building department and we got a rating of 8.
31 All cities are automatically rated at 10. For every point you get less than 10 every
32 citizen who is on or near a floodplain and is required by their mortgage company to
33 carry flood insurance gets a discount. Because we are now part of the Community
34 Rating System, all citizens in Lake Mary who are required to get flood insurance get a
35 10% discount.

36
37 Mr. Paster said Mr. Bates is very involved in keeping that rating. We have to do a report
38 every year and get reviewed every year to make sure we are doing everything we said
39 we would do. They follow up and do a complete audit every five years to make sure we
40 are in good standing with FEMA and the Community Rating System. We will continue
41 with this effort and hopefully get down to a 7 and get everybody a 15% discount on flood
42 insurance. That is the goal.

43
44 Mayor Mealor thanked Messrs. Paster and Bates for a job well done.

1 3. FY 2209 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report –McDimit Davis &
2 Company LLC
3

4 Ms. Sova introduced Kelly Leary of McDimit Davis & Company who has been the City's
5 Audit Manager since 1997. It has been a good relationship. We had another good and
6 successful audit this year. She thanked Jean McCarthy who worked hard during the
7 year and audit period.
8

9 Kelly Leary came forward. She presented the Audit Report on the City's
10 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. The City received the Certificate of
11 Achievement again on their 2008 Comprehensive Annual Report. We submit this to the
12 GFOA and it has to meet specific requirements and since 1992 the City has gotten the
13 Certificate of Achievement. For the 2009 audit, the City got the unqualified opinion
14 which is the best opinion you can get. It says the statements are fairly presented in
15 accordance with the principles they have to follow.
16

17 Ms. Leary said the audit reports in the Audit Report Section in the back of the books say
18 the City is in compliance with laws, regulations, contracts, and grants. We found no
19 indication of non-compliance of laws and regulations. The Management Letter has
20 things the Auditor General requires and we have recommendations for improvements in
21 internal control. This year the letter states that corrective action was taken on the one
22 prior-year comment we had and that there are no current-year comments.
23

24 Ms. Leary said Management Discussion & Analysis starts on Page 13. It is a narrative
25 overview of the document. It summarizes what went on in 2009 and also compares
26 some of the information to 2008. The City's assets exceed the liability by about \$89.5
27 million which is an increase of over \$3 million from the prior year. Most of that increase
28 is in current and other assets. The capital assets decreased about \$1 million this year.
29 There were additions this year but there were depreciation expenses of almost \$3
30 million which reduces the capital assets. Debt decreased by \$1.5 million because the
31 City has been making its loan payments.
32

33 Ms. Leary said the Fund Financial Statements start on Page 29. The fund balance of
34 the General Fund increased about \$1.8 million and that's primarily attributed to the utility
35 tax revenue and Events Center revenue being higher than expected, plus expenditures
36 were lower than budgeted. The Finance Department and City Manager did a great job
37 of managing the budget. The fund balance in the Water & Sewer Fund increased
38 \$440,000 and the Stormwater Fund decreased about \$60,000.
39

40 Ms. Leary said one of the Auditor General's requirements is that we perform financial
41 condition assessment procedures, and there are certain indicators that we look at. We
42 look at the trend that's been going on in the City over the last five years and it also
43 compares the City to other cities that have a similar population or tax base. Lake Mary
44 pretty much had all favorable ratios. There was one that was inconclusive. Lake Mary
45 is a well-run city and looks very good compared to other cities its size.
46

1 Commissioner Gray said we've gotten the award since 1992. She asked Ms. Sova
2 when she started with the City.

3
4 Ms. Sova said 1994. That was one of the criteria for taking the job. She wanted to
5 make sure that was in place because it told her a lot of how things were functioning
6 here.

7
8 Deputy Mayor Brender asked how many cities Ms. Leary deals with obtains the
9 Certificate of Achievement.

10
11 Ms. Leary said we audit 11 cities, two don't apply, but the other nine get it. Not
12 necessarily the first year but once you get it then you know exactly what the
13 requirements are. There is a checklist you go through so you make sure you don't miss
14 anything.

15
16 Mayor Meador said it is a compliment to Ms. Sova serving as the Finance Director as
17 well as the Assistant City Manager.

18
19 **Motion was made by Commissioner Gray to accept the audit as presented,**
20 **seconded by Commissioner Lucarelli and motion carried unanimously.**

21
22 VII. Unfinished Business

23
24 There was no unfinished business at this time.

25
26 VIII. New Business

27
28 A. Ordinance No. 1346 – Granting Florida Power & Light a non-exclusive
29 franchise – First Reading (Public Hearing)

30
31 The City Attorney read Ordinance No. 1346 by title only on first reading.

32
33 Mr. Litton said this process started in November. We have Larry Volenec, Area
34 Manager for Florida Power & Light, present. We had several points of concern going in
35 and the first is the term of 30 years which is a long time. We wanted to ensure we did
36 the best we could for the City of Lake Mary, not only now but in the future. We tried to
37 guess what's going to be out there over that period of time, but nobody knows for sure.

38
39 Mr. Litton said the other thing that was a sticking point for awhile was that Florida Power
40 & Light has basically gone to a 5.9% franchise fee as opposed to 6% that we currently
41 enjoy. We have 6% with Progress Energy so there was a fairness and revenue issue.
42 They did concede that point after it went to their CEO.

43
44 Mr. Volenec said one of the reasons for that is Lake Mary is one of the few that is 6%. A
45 previous calculation was ad valorem taxes plus the franchise amount would be 6%. In
46 the case of Lake Mary we do not have any facilities that we're paying taxes on in the

1 city proper—no substations, no power plant, no service centers—so actually Lake Mary
2 was receiving close to 6%. We went ahead and matched that so it wouldn't be a loss of
3 revenue and so that it would match Progress Energy's franchise agreement.
4

5 Ms. Reischmann said she thought everyone would feel more comfortable with a shorter
6 term and that's something they always strive for. She said Mr. Litton and Ms. Sova
7 looked to make this a shorter term but Florida Power & Light insisted upon the 30-year
8 term. There are probably not any cities around here that have a shorter term so it's
9 pretty standard.

10
11 Mr. Volenec said our standard term is 30 years. There is also a benefit to the city in that
12 the revenue stream is bondable. There is also a benefit to Florida Power & Light to
13 have that 30-year agreement. Less than 30 years there was a lower percentage for the
14 franchise fee. Approximately 175 are at 30 years.

15
16 Ms. Reischmann said that also creates increased incentive for investment for Florida
17 Power & Light that wouldn't be there with a shorter term.

18
19 Ms. Reischmann said you will find no right to purchase the system and we agreed not to
20 compete in electric service. They are not offering it and we didn't insist on it because of
21 the nature of this only serving 2,500 customers, the geographic nature of the City, and
22 the division between the two power companies. It isn't practical even in the 30-year
23 term to look at operating our own electric facility.

24
25 Mr. Volenec said it wasn't in the Florida Statutes so in previous agreements we always
26 included it. It is now in the Florida Statutes so we figured to let it stay in the Florida
27 Statutes and not put it in the actual agreement.

28
29 Ms. Reischmann said there is standard indemnification. The 6% is very important
30 because Progress Energy would want to go to the lower percentage if we didn't get 6%
31 (with Florida Power & Light). There is a Most Favored Nations clause where if a city in
32 any of the three surrounding counties with the same or similar daytime population gets a
33 more favorable percentage then we are entitled to it. We negotiated that. Generally
34 they look to cities with similar customer base but they finally agreed to daytime
35 population since we are unique and have a bigger daytime population than a lot of
36 cities.

37
38 Ms. Reischmann said there are standard provisions for audit. There were a couple of
39 provisions that were very helpful. They will allow us to use renewable energy sources
40 to generate electricity at city facilities such as solar energy sources. Another is
41 recognition of our interest in smart grid technology which allows customers to determine
42 their energy usage. If it becomes system-wide then we are entitled to partake in it.

43
44 Mr. Volenec said that was correct. Florida Power & Light is in line to receive a \$200
45 million grant to implement smart grid technology throughout its electrical system. It is a
46 \$5 million to \$7 million project but there is a benefit to providing customers with their

1 current usage because it helps them conserve. Right now no one knows how much
2 electricity they are using based on the current meters we have but if there is a display in
3 your house that says you are currently using so many dollars per hour of electricity,
4 there's more of an incentive for that. We look forward to being able to implement that
5 system-wide. Some of the other benefits are if electricity is out at a house, we will know
6 that meter is not recording. Right now we rely on people to call in to report power
7 outages. This way it will auto report and we will be able to go out and get the power on
8 more quickly.

9
10 Mayor Meador asked Mr. Volenec to state his name for the record.

11
12 Larry Volenec, External Affairs Manager with Florida Power & Light.

13
14 Mayor Meador asked if anyone wanted to speak in reference to Ordinance No. 1346. No
15 one came forward and the public hearing was closed.

16
17 Mayor Meador said the negotiations were long and difficult but felt they were very fair.
18 Florida Power & Light does a very good job as a corporate neighbor in times of need.
19 Seminole State College is a very important driver for economic development initiatives,
20 and in their expansion program, Florida Power & Light was very helpful and
21 accommodating. He wanted to recognize that and say thank you. It's very helpful to
22 the greater Seminole County communities when they are successful.

23
24 **Motion was made by Commissioner Lucarelli to approve Ordinance No. 1346 on**
25 **first reading, seconded by Deputy Mayor Brender and motion carried by roll-call**
26 **vote: Deputy Mayor Brender, Yes; Commissioner Duryea, Yes; Commissioner**
27 **Gray, Yes; Commissioner Lucarelli, Yes; Mayor Meador, Yes.**

28
29 B. Ordinance No. 1347 – Amending Ordinance 832, providing a fee for police
30 public records check – First Reading (Public Hearing)

31
32 Mr. Litton requested to postpone this item until the next meeting (April 1, 2010).

33
34 **Motion was made by Deputy Mayor Brender to postpone Ordinance No. 1347 until**
35 **April 1, 2010, seconded by Commissioner Duryea and motion carried**
36 **unanimously.**

37
38 IX. Citizen Participation

39
40 No one came forward and this time and citizen participation was closed.

41
42 X. Reports

43
44 A. City Manager

- 1 1. Request Commission award bid for water meter relocation services to Above
2 Below Site Construction in an amount not to exceed \$86,056.37 and authorize
3 City Manager to execute contract
4

5 Mr. Litton asked the Commission to award the bid for the water meter relocations to
6 Above Below Site Construction Corporation in the amount of \$86,056.37. We have
7 \$150,000.00 budgeted. This is to move the meters to the rights-of-way at the front of
8 the residences. This has been an ongoing project for several years. We had seven
9 responses to the bid and they were all over the board. Some are very hungry for
10 business but Above Below Site Construction Corporation checked out and their
11 references were good. He recommended approval.
12

13 **Motion was made by Commissioner Duryea to award the bid for water meter**
14 **relocation services to Above Below Site Construction Corporation in an amount**
15 **not to exceed \$86,056.37 and authorize the City Manager to execute contract,**
16 **seconded by Commissioner Lucarelli and motion carried unanimously.**
17

- 18 2. Request Commission make appointments/reappointments to Code Enforcement
19 Board
20

21 Mr. Litton said this is a request for appointments/reappointments to the Code
22 Enforcement Board. Mr. Rosier has decided to retire leaving one opening, and Allan
23 Hall and Linda Binkley are up for reappointment. Both have indicated a willingness to
24 continue. We had one withdrawal from the last time we discussed this. Michelle Pavlik
25 is no longer interested. There are three people who have expressed an interest: Mr.
26 Tremel, Mr. Hess, and Mr. Clauss or the Commission can appoint other people who
27 may not have submitted but might have indicated they are interested.
28

29 Mayor Mealor suggested to deal with the vacancy first. He said Commissioner Duryea
30 made a good point the last time we took part in board appointments, and he used the
31 term "new energy". There is a gentleman that many of them know. He has had the
32 privilege of knowing him since before he entered elementary school. He attended Lake
33 Mary Elementary School, he distinguished himself at Lake Mary High School, received
34 a full scholarship in football to Clemson University, returned home, is a recent graduate
35 of the University of Central Florida, has been accepted to law school effective this fall,
36 and that is Mr. Michael Taylor Tremel. That's the kind of background, enthusiasm, and
37 knowledge base that could be helpful to this particular board. It is a compliment that
38 somebody has actively engaged us in wanting to become involved and serving our city.
39

40 Mayor Mealor nominated Michael Taylor Tremel for the open position on the Code
41 Enforcement Board.
42

43 Commissioner Gray suggested postponing this because she did a mapping and all of
44 our current representatives and the three people who submitted a form are east of
45 Longwood-Lake Mary Road. If we postpone it then it gives an opportunity to recruit
46 people that live west of Longwood-Lake Mary Road.

1
2 Mayor Mealor said it is in the City's best interest to fill that vacancy right now. We don't
3 have to reappoint and can deal with that at a later meeting if they want to look at
4 geographic distribution.

5
6 Commissioner Gray said she was talking about reappointments and new appointments
7 because everybody is east of Longwood-Lake Mary Road.

8
9 Mr. Litton said they have been trying to recruit and these are all we have. It has been
10 on the Web and everywhere.

11
12 Commissioner Duryea nominated Mr. Clauss for the open position.

13
14 Commissioner Brender nominated Mr. Hess.

15
16 Commissioner Lucarelli seconded the nomination for Michael Tremel because she liked
17 to see younger people getting involved in city functions.

37 Mayor Mealor asked the Commission's pleasure in relation to the positions held by Mr.
38 Hall and Ms. Binkley.

39
40 Deputy Mayor Brender said it had generally been the Commission's position to
41 reappoint unless there has been some problem. He said he was not aware of any
42 difficulties on Code Enforcement.

43
44 **Motion was made by Deputy Mayor Brender to reappoint Allan Hall and Linda**
45 **Binkley to the Code Enforcement Board, seconded by Commissioner Duryea.**

7 Mayor Mealor said that does take the three votes necessary and Mr. Hall and Ms.
8 Binkley have been reappointed to the Code Enforcement Board. He thanked them for
9 their service and willingness to continue to serve.

10

11 Mr. Litton said the Lake Mary Fire Department has decided they would rather start
12 collecting for Muscular Dystrophy in the spring instead of the Labor Day weekend. They
13 will have crews collecting during the cooler time of the year and hopefully will
14 experience more favorable weather conditions to include avoiding the afternoon
15 showers.

19 Mr. Litton said they are planning on March 19th, 20th and 21st from 9:00 A.M. to 4:00
20 P.M. at Greenwood Boulevard and Lake Mary Boulevard, Lake Emma Road and Lake
21 Mary Boulevard, and 46A and Rinehart Road. The Board had no objections to the
22 change.

23

24 Mr. Litton said we have started receiving more complaints about people putting their
25 garbage and yard waste out too soon or leaving their carts by the road for days after
26 pick up. According to the City's ordinance there are no carts or debris to be placed out
27 for collection earlier than 6:00 P.M. the day prior to a scheduled pickup and no later
28 than 6:00 A.M. on the day of collection. Containers must be removed no later than 8:00
29 P.M. on the day they are emptied.

30

31 Mr. Litton reminded everyone of the Fifth Annual 5K Run to be held on March 20th, 8:00
32 A.M., at the Timacuan Golf Club. For more information visit www.beatrailblazer.com.

33

34 Mr. Litton said the Easter Festival has been scheduled for April 3rd from 10:00 A.M. to
35 2:00 P.M. at Central Park. The Easter Bunny will be there and there will be games and
36 prizes. The Farmer's Market will be open from 9:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M.

37

38 Mr. Litton said on March 27th the palm trees at Trailhead Park would be coming down.
39 They are in the Progress Energy right-of-way.

40

41 Mr. Carrico showed a photograph of the existing palm trees at Trailhead Park on the
42 overhead projector. He said they would be taking them out one by one and piece by
43 piece. They are going to bring in Pindo Palms which will be between 8 and 13 feet and
44 they grow to a height of 16 feet. That's worth quite a bit of money but the City crews will
45 have to plant them or the City will have to pay \$3,500 for the planting and staking of
46 those trees. They are removing them because of the power lines.

1
2 Mr. Litton said he had asked Sue Thorne to send the Commission a copy of the
3 Acoustical Consulting and Noise Control Report that we had prepared by an
4 independent consultant. He said he was pleased with the results and is in the process
5 of acquiring the meter so we can monitor that. He thought that's all they needed to do
6 for the time being.

7
8 B. Mayor

9 1. Election of Deputy Mayor

10
11 Mayor Meador said according to Section 4.04 of the City Charter coupled with direction
12 from the Strategic Planning Session of 2004, it was the consensus of the Commission
13 that the Mayor would nominate an individual to serve as Deputy Mayor. He said the
14 community was very gracious to let him come back. The growth at the university
15 coupled with his job title requires a great deal of time commitment which he gladly
16 gives. That coupled with two recent events where he had to be away from the
17 Commission meeting as his son deployed and on Lake Mary Days he was not here but
18 was with his father celebrating his 87th birthday. Sometimes it is literally at the last
19 moment. He would make a call to the current Deputy Mayor and without fail he always
20 steps in and does a remarkably good job. As his way of saying thank you for his
21 unselfish service, he nominated Commissioner Gary Brender as Deputy Mayor for one
22 year.

23
24 **Motion was made by Mayor Meador to reappoint Commissioner Gary Brender as**
25 **Deputy Mayor, seconded by Commissioner Duryea and motion carried**
26 **unanimously.**

27
28 C. Commissioners (2)

29
30 Commissioner Duryea said he attended the car show last Saturday night. Everyone
31 had a good time and the vendors were very happy. There was also a wedding and the
32 DJ shut down while the wedding was going on. Everyone should all come out to the
33 next one.

34
35 Commissioner Gray said Lake Mary Celebrates was successful. We had more vendors
36 than in previous years.

37
38 Commissioner Gray said at the museum, Joe Rosier (the Storyteller) did Alexander

40 museum is rocking.

41
42 Commissioner Gray distributed some fliers telling events coming up at the museum.
43 She suggested putting some out by the cashier's window at city hall.

45 Commissioner Gray said she attended the Tri-County League of Cities and they had a
46 presentation on public and private partnerships and the benefits of those partnerships.

1
2 Commissioner Gray reminded everyone of the 5K run on Saturday at Timacuan. There
3 is also a golf tournament that day.
4

5 Commissioner Gray thanked the Chief's crew for coming out to Timacuan last night.
6 We had a night golf tournament and because of the break-ins, many of the homeowners
7 didn't know what was going on and they called the police. They were very responsive
8 and checked some ID's and nobody had a problem with that.
9

10 Commissioner Lucarelli said she attended Lake Mary Celebrates and there was a very
11 good turnout.

13 Commissioner Lucarelli reminded everyone of Family Fun Day on April 24th from 11:00
14 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. To date we have about 50 local companies and businesses involved
15 as sponsors, we have four different inflatables, a bungee run, a joust, rock climbing wall,
16 bounce house, pony rides, carnival games for kids, food for purchase, and we are
17 working on a butterfly exhibit. It will be a lot of fun. Some of the sponsors will have
18 games and raffles going on in their booth. There will be something for everybody and

20 see a preview of a gentleman who is performing. He is very comedic but with a good
21 message to the kids about not bullying, staying off drugs, and making good life choices.
22 He does interactive things with the crowd. We have some live bands coming as well.

24 Commissioner Lucarelli reminded everyone of Relay for Life on April 16th and 17th (at
25 Colonial Towne Park). She invited everyone to get on the team and walk but if not
26 would appreciate a donation to the Lake Mary team. This is raising money for the
27 American Cancer Society. She said she was dedicating any funds that she gets to the
28 memory of her favorite uncle who passed away from throat cancer.

30 Deputy Mayor Brender said Lake Mary Celebrates was a good day. He complimented
31 staff and everybody involved.

33 Deputy Mayor Brender said the Seminole County Public School Foundation had an
34 event at Alaqua Country Club where they were honoring the sports heroes of Seminole
35 County Public Schools. He attended that function to support the Foundation. You
36 would not believe the list of now pro sports players involved in all kinds of different
37 sports. A remarkable number of people came out of Seminole County Schools. He
38 complimented the Foundation.
39

40 Deputy Mayor Brender said he was at Lake Mary High School this past Saturday and
41 did the opening ceremonies for the Special Olympics. Several hundred people came to
42 watch and there were 100 or so participants. They had a lot of help from some of the
43 service groups at Lake Mary High School. Lake Mary High School gives them the field.
44 It was a terrific day for the community.
45

1 Deputy Mayor Brender said on Saturday evening he would be judging the Miss Lake
2 Mary Pageant.
